After 90 days, he went home thinking his enlistment had expired. He then joined the Federal 5th Kentucky Cavalry in August of 1862. Confederate General John Hunt Morgan's troops captured Elvis Parker near what is now Gallatin. He was court martialled and was found guilty of desertion. His father, Dempsey, was an ardent Unionist, wouldn't denounce his devotion to the Union and a challenge occurred which lead to his son's death by shooting at Morgan's camp at Mills Woods outside of Hartsville. Confederate guerrillas hidden in the brush of Goose Creek ambushed Union Cos. D and E, 11th Kentucky Infantry, and Co. I, 8th Kentucky Cavalry.
